Word from the Pastor

While there are many mainline Protestants today who continue to maintain that it is a slippery slope, I am among those that firmly believe that a progressive approach to the Christian faith is the future of the church in this country, and yes, even in Tulsa (eventually).

Even though College Hill has long been progressive in the arena of social justice issues, we are still exploring what it means to be progressive when it comes to theological issues. Perhaps the hallmark of a progressive approach is allowing ourselves to question long-held assumptions and understandings of church orthodoxy. This includes being able to explore new understandings of church doctrines and biblical interpretation.

The **Rev. Don Roulet** and I are thrilled at the high level of participation in the adult church school class that is discussing ***Saving Jesus Redux*** (a *Living the Questions* DVD-based curriculum). One of the first things we have been exploring is the **difference between faith** (that in which you put your trust, including living a life based on the teachings of Jesus and what Jesus taught about God) **and belief** (that in which you give your intellectual assent, which involves a focus on what the church teaches about Jesus).

In *Lesson 1: Jesus Through the Ages*, they make the case that the traditional approach to Christianity that focuses on believing what is stated in the ancient creeds is increasingly unpersuasive in today's society. Some provocative questions are raised, such as:

- If the Christian faith is not primarily about the afterlife, then what is it about?
- If the Bible is not primarily factual material, then how do we read it?
- If God is not an interventionist God, then what is prayer about?

This class, as with progressive Christianity itself, is not about trying to fulfill our natural desire for excessive certitude, or finding the "right" answers. In other words, the life of faith is more about the journey together than the destination.

Concerning a progressive approach to biblical interpretation, I want to invite all of you to an event sponsored by the **Progressive Religious Coalition of Tulsa** on Sunday afternoon, October 16, from 2-4 p.m. here at College Hill. The theme: ***Is the Bible 'True'? – a Progressive Approach.***

I can't tell you how much it means to me to serve as your pastor – to be part of a congregation that takes its sense of community and its exploration of faith so seriously.

CHURCH MICE

The **Christian Education Ministry Team** is pleased to present the new **Elementary Class Computer Lab ("Church Mice")**.

Our elementary children have been using very outdated and mostly non-functioning computers as part of their church school curriculum for some time. Due to a special program offered by Hewlett-Packard, we were able to purchase 5 refurbished desktop computers and new flat-screen monitors at a very low price. These, as well as two computers salvaged from the old equipment, have allowed us to replace **Karen Kriner's** office computer and set up a 6 computer lab in the new Upper Elementary classroom on the third floor.

This project was made possible by sponsorship from **Mark Watson** through his relationship with HP and **Todd Redding** taking time from his busy schedule to set up all the computers in the lab. We are so grateful for their assistance. We are very thankful that the project was funded by the **Hill Memorial CE Fund**, the Information Technology budget, the CE budget and donations from a few individual church members. All was accomplished with *less than* \$1200 from church funds!

Our hope is to establish a wireless network and wireless printing capability in the near future. This will permit our elementary children to take full advantage of computer-based curriculum as part of their learning experience. This project is a multi-generational gift to our children of which we should all be proud. Please come watch our progress!

Highlights of the September Session Meeting

Clerk's Report:

- ❖ Session approved to renew the Commissioned Lay Preacher agreement with **Rider Allen** for 2012.

Pastor's Report:

- ❖ **Rev. Freeman** reported that he will be on vacation September 28 to October 4 in Dallas - out on Sunday, October 2.
- ❖ **Rev. Freeman** reported that he will be on Study Leave October 24 to October 30 at Christ in the Desert Monastery, NM - out on Sunday, Oct. 30.

New Business:

- ❖ The Session received **Meredith Howard** into the Active Membership of College Hill Presbyterian Church:
- ❖ There will be a **Called Congregational Meeting** on **Sunday, November 6, 2011, following worship in the Sanctuary to elect Elders.**
- ❖ **Johnna Thurston** elected as Elder Commissioner to the Presbytery Meeting, September 16-17, 2011 at Dwight Mission.
- ❖ **Bill Nole** reported that Lutheran Church of the Good Shepherd is going out of business and is selling their chimes. Session approved bidding on them and they will cost between \$500-\$800 from the Designated Music Fund.

Old Business:

- ❖ **Bill Major**, from the Visioning task force, provided the results of the *US Congregational Life Survey* taken in March by 80 respondents. He discussed the Questionnaire portion of the survey and next month will discuss the Strengths report.
- ❖ **Pastor Todd** reported that the **More Light Celebration** was a very joyous and historic service. It was very emotional to see **Rev. Radford Rader** put his stole back on 11 years after removing it.
- ❖ **Pastor Todd** reported the **100th Anniversary Celebration** will be held on **Saturday, February 25, at the Campbell Hotel, 11th & Columbia.** We discussed a new photo directory, published after the celebration so we can include photos from it.
- ❖ **Pastor Todd** reported that the organ project is near completion. **Alta Selvey** is finalizing the list of items to be completed on it.
- ❖ **Pastor Todd** reported that the Kaiser Foundation is giving funds directly to TU to support the YMP program. TU will pay the KWI YMP staff.
- ❖ **Todd Redding** reported that two (\$249 each) refurbished computers were purchased using the **Jane Hill Memorial Christian Education Fund**; **Bill Nole** reported that \$2,653 from the **Music Fund** was spent on bell tables and foam; and **Wyneth Roulet** reported that \$629 was spent out of the **Congregational Life Fund** on a new refrigerator for the Fellowship Hall kitchen.

Highlights of Ministry Team Reports

Building & Grounds: **Jim Campbell** reported all 4 air conditioner compressors are working in the sanctuary.

Christian Education: **Todd Redding** presented for approval the list of Teachers, Youth Sponsors and Children's Music Director and curriculum for the Fall/Winter 2011: Early Childhood: **Nancy Gammie**, **Gini Fox** (assistant/substitute) and **Alix Featherston** (Nursery); Early Elementary: **Linda Watts**, **Jana Stagner** (assistant/substitute); Upper Elementary/Middle School: **Karen Kriner**, assistants: **Judy Pacenza** and **Andrew Redding**; Youth: **John Gammie** and **Danielle Hovenga**; Adult: **Rev. Todd Freeman** and **Rev. Don Roulet**; Children's Music Director: **Caroline Johnson**.

Todd R. also reported that we now have an **Elementary Computer Lab** with five refurbished HP Slimline computers purchased for \$249 each (\$1245): 2 from the Hill Memorial Fund, 1 from the IT budget and 2 donated by members. Five flat screen LCD monitors were purchased for \$97.50 each (\$487): 4 from the CE budget and 1 donated by a member. **Total cost: \$1732** (\$1137 from church budget). The reconfiguring of the CE classrooms was also presented: the new Upper Elementary/Middle School class (3rd floor divided room – top of west stairwell), the new Early Elementary (3rd floor – top of east stairwell) and the new Children's Activity/Worship Connection Room in the old Elementary classroom (2nd floor – top of west stairwell).

Congregational Life: **Wyneth Roulet** reported that the team hosted the receptions for **Sam Wood's** and **Mike Evanson's** mother, Ann's, memorial services on August 20 and August 27, respectively, and the Potluck following the More Light Celebration on August 21st. Small Group Dinners are starting in September (**Gretchen Hannefield** and **Susan West**, coordinators) and **Pat Valencia** is compiling the **cookbook** for the 100 year celebration. The next big event is the **Trunk & Treat on Monday, October 31st, 7:00 p.m.**

Finance & Stewardship: **Bob Lucy** requested that Ministry Teams have their **2012 proposed budgets by Tuesday, September 27, to Finance and Stewardship Team (David Robertson).** The Stewardship letter from members-at-large will be mailed to the congregation on October 17th with **Commitment Sunday on November 13th.**

Hispanic Ministry: **Pastor Todd** discussed leadership issues with the Hispanic congregation. He also reported on the August 19 decision of the Presbyterian National Church of Mexico to end its relationship with the Presbyterian Church (USA), after 139 years, as a result of the passage of Amendment 10-A and specifically related to the potential for ordination of openly gay persons.

Nominating: **Dena Schone** reported that they are in the process of recruiting Ruling Elders for the Class of 2014.

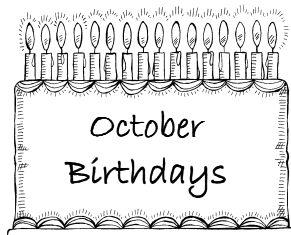
Outreach & Mission: **Dewey Echols** reported that micro banking coffee sales have started. The team received a thank you note from **Openarms** for the dinners we provide every other month (signed by the youth) and **Tim Gillean** will provide a "moment for mission" on October 2nd on Openarms.

Personnel: **Pastor Todd** reported that **Jim Brady** and **Fred Schone** are completing **Lisa Hays'** annual review.

Worship & Music: **Bill Nole** reported there was significant discussion regarding worship services during the Advent season and into the new year. With Christmas and New Year's Day on Sundays this year, options are being discussed. They are also discussing with Christian Education options for the Christmas Eve service. The **choir will provide special music during the service on December 4th.** They are recruiting pulpits for October 2nd and October 30th when **Pastor Todd** will be away. They continue to research information about using the internet to "broadcast" parts of worship, including podcasts, video for download and video streaming.

The Quiet Corner *Summer's Light*

The light this summer had a harsh brittleness. Its shards stabbed the life from any greenery. It seared through eyelids. It flashed restraint into impatience. It sapped the spirit of all refreshment.

It was the light bombarding into molecules and other sundry particles labeled in chemistry class, that caused the pain of summer heat. We were uncomfortable. We experienced it and the more we thought of it, the more uncomfortable we became. Light was usually a gentle thing, a soft glow that brought warmth. We notice and do not recognize. We are usually comfortable with common things that do not force us to think.

Duality is a word that causes discomfort. The light of summer is an everyday duality. It is both energy and matter existing together. Trying to resolve this duality can result in a brain-ache for all except the most brilliant quantum physicist.

We live in a world of duality, which we prefer to conveniently ignore. Thoughts are filtered into duality-ignoring stereotypes. Some may be labeled as "good" or "useful." Others may be labeled "bad" or "worthless." The world becomes a place of artificial "Either / Or" and not reality's "Both / And." Living in a "Either / Or" world causes much distress and hurt. It is not the world as it is, but the world as we would want it to be.

Deity and spirituality are often presented in the language of "Either / Or." One can accept this as easily as one can accept that the summer heat was caused by the sun's light alone. Deity and spirituality need to be thought of inhabiting the realm of "Both / And." This is a mystery that can be contemplated for a lifetime.

Tales of a Sojourner*

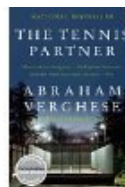
It is unusual in the jail to see women past middle age, yet there she was, sitting in the back and looking like she was going to cry. The younger women were sharing their excitement about being placed in drug rehab programs.

Her name was Mary and she stayed behind after the others left to tell me her story. She had spent the better part of her life in jail and prison - five different times - one after the other with a little space in-between - all for possession of seriously illegal drugs. She never sold drugs and she hated herself because she couldn't kick the habit. I reached out to hug her and she fell into my arms, suddenly the tears began to flow. "Pastor Pat, I am 59 years old and all this time all I ever wanted was to quit but no one ever offered me a place with a drug rehab program. Why can't they help me?"

God of justice, thank you for legislatures and community leaders who have found funds to create programs that help people recover from the tragic effects of drug addiction. And God of compassion, give Mary the courage and the persistence to do the hard work of learning how to live without drugs.

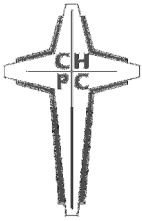


October Book Club: *The Tennis Partner* by Abraham Verghese

The Tennis Partner is Abraham Verghese's memoir dealing with friendship, moving and starting over, fatherhood, divorce, addiction, the pressure of medical school, and of course, the game of tennis. Verghese recounts his friendship with David Smith, a medical student where Verghese, a physician, has taken on a new faculty position. Both are struggling in different ways dealing with starting anew, and both have a passion for the game of tennis.

As Smith is a former tennis pro, he takes on the role of teacher on the court, converse to their relationship at the hospital. Amazon.com Review describes *The Tennis Partner* as follows: "A paean to the healing powers of tennis, this book is also a moving meditation on friendship, fatherhood, love, addiction, and the particular loneliness of physicians."

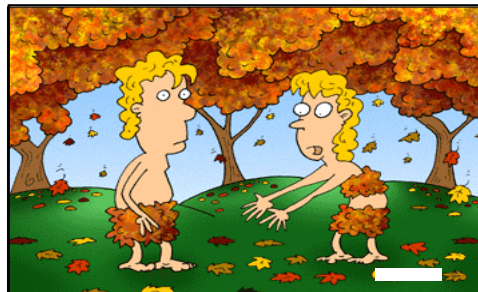
