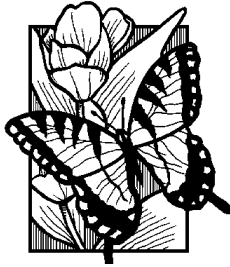

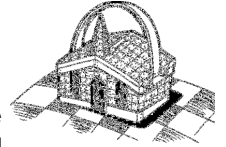

Summer Church School is Here!

We at **College Hill** are fortunate to have such a skilled and dedicated teaching staff at all age levels of our church school. Here is a brief update of the planned summer curriculum.

The **Preschool/Kindergarten** class will complete their current Winter/Spring curriculum, and then begin a Cokesbury curriculum entitled Shake It Up Café: Where Kid's Carry Out God's Recipe for the remainder of the summer.

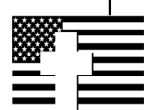
GREEN COFFEE TIME?

At the April Session meeting the **College Hill Youth Group** requested we consider ways to make our coffee time before and after church more **eco-friendly**. Here are their suggestions:

- **USE A MUG.** Bring your own or use one the church mugs that will be provided. Put used church mugs on the cart for washing. (We will help wash.)
- **USE PAPER** (if you don't have a mug). We will provide cardboard cups instead of Styrofoam ones.
- **RECYCLE** any paper used. We will provide a recycling bin near the coffee.
- **GO EASY** on the non-dairy creamer (trans fats). We will look for trans fat free alternatives.

By using **Fair Trade coffee**, the **CHP** coffee time is already helping others. These are ways for us to make a difference over our cup of coffee or tea.

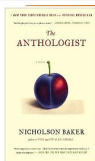
May Meal at the Day Center

Book Club Reads

The Anthologist in April/May

by Nicholson Baker



The Anthologist is a book about poetry written by a novelist who somehow makes it all work. By turns you will be fascinated, enlightened, surprised and amused. This is the story of Paul Chowder, a semi-successful, middle aged American poet trying and mostly failing to write the introduction to an anthology called "Only Rhyme". Chowder sits in his workplace/barn and thinks; he shampoos the dog; he goes blackberry picking; he installs flooring for a neighbor; he pines for his former girlfriend, Roz, who left him after becoming fed up with his procrastination. The book seamlessly weaves together the story of this difficult period in Paul's life and stories of poetry.

The Anthologist by Nicholson Baker is available at Steve's Sundry Books. Book club will meet for lunch and discussion on **Sunday, May 1st**, in the library immediately following worship service.

Tales of a Sojourner*

Selva has been in jail for more than six months, wearing the red uniform that marks her as a federal prisoner. She is an attractive woman, probably in her early 30's. She speaks no English and I speak no Spanish – but somehow we have built a relationship that is extraordinary. Sometimes there are bilingual inmates who are willing to translate for us but often, she has been the only Spanish-speaking inmate in the pod, locked in an American jail day after long day with no one to talk to and nothing to read except the Spanish language Upper Room that I bring for her.

Last week, things changed dramatically. **Ellen Beverly**, church member and TU student, translated a Bible study for Selva who was thrilled. We have shared many hugs, but this was a special one. And then, miracle of miracles, the next week, Ellen sent real books written in Spanish for Selva. Before I left, Selva had called together all the immigrants in the pod to share the precious books. You would have thought it was Christmas morning – extra special hugs all around!

Thanks be to God for Ellen who perhaps has read this scripture:

When an alien resides with you in your land, you shall not oppress the alien. The alien who resides with you shall be to you as the citizen among you; you shall love the alien as yourself, for you were aliens in the land of Egypt. Lev.19:33-34

Highlights of the April Session Meeting

Clerk's Report:

- ❖ Received a request for a Certificate of Transfer for **Paul Hartman** who has joined First Presbyterian Church, Cheyenne, Wyoming where his wife, Rev. Diana Hartman, is Associate Pastor.

Pastor's Report:

- ❖ **Rev. Todd** discussed the **Progressive Religious Coalition of Tulsa's** inaugural event on Sunday, **April 10, 2011**, entitled **Was Jesus Sacrificed?** There were 70 people in attendance with 25 from College Hill.

Old Business:

- ❖ An organ contract has been signed and Roger Banks will begin work in early May.
- ❖ The Visioning Survey (U.S. Congregational Life Survey) has not been returned, yet. Once we have received it, the Visioning Team will meet every Sunday morning to begin the visioning process.

Highlights of Ministry Team Reports

Building & Grounds: **Jim Campbell** reported that the **Work Day** on April 9 went well with over 25 people participating. Lots of projects were completed. **Jeff Ream** has joined the Ministry Team!

Christian Education: **Todd Redding** presented a list of Spring/Summer Church School Curriculum for Early Childhood, Elementary and Adult classes. **All children and adult church school classes will be on break during July 2011** in order to give the teachers a well-deserved break before gearing up for the Fall. **Rally Day will be September 11.** A new class, Early Elementary, will be led by **Linda Watts**. **Karen Kriner** will lead the Upper Elementary/Middle School class. The name of the Hill Memorial Fund had been changed on the Financial report to the Nursery Equipment Fund. **Marilyn Hill** said that the fund was set up as the **Jane Patton Hill Memorial Christian Education Fund** in memory of her mother.

- **The Session approved, after it was moved and seconded, to change the name from the Nursery Equipment Fund to the Jane Patton Hill Memorial Christian Education Fund.**

Congregational Life: **Wyneth Roulet** reported that **Susan West** had several people in her **CPR class** on **April 10**. Their next two big events will be the **All-church Breakfast on Sunday, May 8th, 8:30-9:30 a.m., in Fellowship Hall** and an **All-church Picnic at the home of Rev. Freeman, immediately following worship, Sunday, May 29th.**

John Gammie reported that the **Youth Group** would like to stop using Styrofoam cups for coffee, instead using the "more-green" alternative of paper cups or porcelain mugs. They would also like to provide a recycling bin for aluminum and plastic. This has been discussed in the past in regards to the cost and time of washing the mugs, but the Youth were given the "green light" to develop a plan.

Evangelism & Communication: **Mark Watson** reported that College Hill gets over 1,000 hits monthly on our website from 20 different countries. It was discussed that we need a **New Member Packet** which might include a pledge card, list of Ministry Teams and what they do and the church directory. **Dewey** volunteered to help **Mark** and **Pastor Todd** develop the packet.

Finance & Stewardship: **Bob Lucy** reported that we are having computer problems in the church office with our "online" capability not being reliable. **There is no Financial Report this month due to the busy tax season.** They plan to have a report in May, which will cover our first four months.

Hispanic Steering Committee (Immigrant Hispanic Fellowship): **John Gammie** reported that Rosie Brown, the EOP Liaison, has returned from a two-month trip to Mexico. She will take copies of our Vision Statement, Goals and Budget to the Presbytery Committee of Developing Congregations. However, she thinks that Presbytery should begin asking other churches to put this ministry in their budgets and some of our committee may need to be involved in that effort. On Wednesday evenings, the Hispanic congregation is meeting at the church for Bible study led by the women leaders. The English language class, taught by **Ellen Beverly**, is going well and is appreciated. **Ricardo Chavez** will enter seminary on April 29 in Mexico City and asks for our prayers.

Nominating: **Dena Schone** requested names of members to be given to her for consideration as elders for the Class of 2014.

Outreach & Mission: **Pastor Todd** introduced **Rev. Leslie Penrose**, Executive Director of **JustHope**, an organization that is creating global partnerships and nurturing human community. She spoke to the Session regarding their vision, mission and projects, particularly **Microcredit for Women**. We have already been supporting their micro-banking project and Free Trade coffee through our Advent Holiday Market and buying Free Trade coffee for use in Fellowship Hall.

- **The Session approved the motion to proceed to support JustHope.**








Dewey reported that we have not yet heard from the EOP regarding our application for a grant to be used for Kendall Whittier Inc., but expect to hear in June.

The Quiet Corner A Mowing Meditation



Meditation requires that one remain totally engrossed in the present. The familiar breath focus reminds one to savor that breath since another is not promised. In contemplative meditation, the body is stilled. However, there is another meditation practice where the body is kept in motion through walking.

In Eastern practice, this is called *kinhin*, or 'to go straight'. A slow pace permits one to become aware of air movement, of ground under the feet, of weight shifting. While the eastern practice is walked in a large circle, the pattern traditionally used in the Christian tradition is a labyrinth. Labyrinths have been found in Christian churches since the 3rd century. Many of the great medieval cathedrals had these sacred patterns inscribed into the nave floor. Pilgrims traveled to these great cathedral labyrinths to prayerfully tread the sacred path in quiet contemplation. Ecclesiastical pronouncements bestowed all the spiritual boons of a Holy Land pilgrimage on those who made this sacred walk. While the labyrinth pattern may appear to be a maze, there are no blind or false ends. Its twisting path disengages the mind from measuring the distance traveled. The walking is all.

Mowing a lawn can be a labyrinth experience. What is mowing but walking (or riding) a twisting path that goes nowhere? Each footfall, each bump of the lawn mower's wheels calls the one mowing to awareness of the senses. The constant whine of the engine is a mechanical chant. The eye scans greenness. Each breath is perfumed with the scent of spring onion. The air caresses hands taunt with tension. One tastes the vitality of life. The entire universe contracts to a patch of unmown grass, the lawn mower and the walker. There is no destination. There is no goal. There is only the walking. There is only the Now.

And in the sacredness of moment, the lawn is mowed and the spirit refreshed.

Staying Connected May 2011

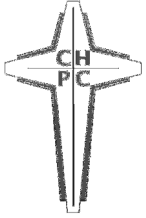
Dear Friends,

Community Development and Outreach efforts are at full speed, with many changes happening in the Kendall-Whittier neighborhood all at once. At a recent community meeting someone said, "It feels like community change on steroids!" Here are some highlights, so that you can stay connected and involved:

- Kendall-Whittier Elementary school principal, **Judy Feary**, has been reassigned by the district to serve as the lead in the School Improvement Office. Ms. Feary is beloved in our neighborhood, and has given us a premier school. She partnered with the K-W community to create a Community Schools environment, before it became a Tulsa model for successful schools in all neighborhoods, but especially in communities with children living in poverty. Additionally, Ms. Feary responded quickly and thoughtfully to the dramatic shift in the racial and cultural demographics of our neighborhood children. She created a welcoming environment, adjusting communications, teaching resources, and staffing to accommodate the needs of children and parents where English is not the first language.
- **Project School House:** You have likely heard a lot about Project School House. The final proposal is not completed. When it is completed it will go to the School Board for vote. How the final plan will look is not unknown, but is likely to reflect huge changes in our neighborhood. Our elementary school will likely stay the same, with the addition of 6th grade. The reports seem to indicate that Will Rogers becomes a 7th-12th grade school that requires an application process, and that students would be working toward graduating with a college associates degree. K-W children would be accepted at 7th grade with parental agreement to the rigor of instruction and the commitment of the student and family. At 10th grade, should their test scores not be at college bound levels, students would have to apply to transfer to another TPS school, or attend McClain H.S. Wilson and Cleveland Middle Schools are proposed to close.
- **West Park Expansion:** You are invited to view the final plans for the K-W West Park and proposed other improvements, on Wednesday, May 4th from 5:00 to 7:00 pm, at the Educare Center. The design team will be available to answer questions. Implementation of these plans will begin shortly.
- **The steel is raised on the new Community Health Connection building on 3rd and Lewis!**
- **Dewey Echols**, a member at **College Hill Presbyterian Church**, received the para-professional of the year award at Kendall-Whittier Elementary School. Thank you Dewey for your commitment to the children of our neighborhood, and your efforts that clearly go above and beyond!
- Honorary KWI Board member, and President of the University of Tulsa, **Steadman Upham**, has announced his upcoming retirement scheduled for this time next year. President Upham has brought many gifts to the University and the Tulsa community. He has opened the doors and brought students, faculty, and staff into the community. Our KWI volunteer numbers have tripled because of the environment of giving and community service fostered by this kind and wise leader.
